On 19 May 2014, the International Narcotics Control Board (INCB) elected Dr. Lochan Naidoo, a national of South Africa, its new President at INCB's 110<sup>th</sup> session which took place in Vienna from 19 to 30 May.

Dr. Naidoo has been a member of INCB since 2010, served as First Vice-President of the Board in 2012, and has also served as a Member of the Board's Standing Committee on Estimates (2011) and Committee on Finance and Administration (2011).

# **Key Issues and Special Topics**

"...for every \$1 spent, good prevention programmes can save Governments up to \$10 in subsequent costs..."

Chapter I of the INCB Annual Report 2013 entitled "economic consequences of drug abuse" highlights the key role prevention programmes play when developing drug policies. Investing in prevention and treatment is a sound policy decision that can lead to significant savings in five primary areas: health, public safety, crime, productivity and governance. Read more.

## **Proportionality and drug-related offences**

In the use of criminal law to address drug-related crime, States must find the right balance between the measures imposed and the severity of the offence. Reflecting the principle of proportionality, the international drug control conventions establish minimum standards to allow States to develop their policies within the legal framework of the conventions and in a proportionate way. The Board expands on this subject in Chapter I of the INCB Annual Report 2007. Read more.

# **UK Report on Ketamine**

A recent report reviewing the evidence of the misuse and harms of ketamine and its analogues has been published by the Advisory Council on the Misuse of Drugs in the United Kingdom.

Providing detailed assessment on the harm associated with the misuse of ketamine, the report recommends that ketamine be put under tighter control under the Misuse of Drugs Act (1971) as a Class B drug, in light of the new evidence of its chronic toxicity to the bladder. Since the report was released, ketamine was reclassified pursuant to the recommendation contained within the report on 10 June 2014.

In addition, the report recommends ketamine be placed as a higher schedule drug in the Misuse of Drugs Regulations (2001) because of the high potential risk of harm in case of diversion. This measure is currently subject to public consultations expected to be concluded by the end of 2014. Read the report.
